COURSE DESCRIPTION

A survey course that outlines the development of doctrine and belief from the earliest disciples to the eve of the Reformation. The class will focus on the development of Christian thought, focusing only on related social forces as they pertain to the development of Christian doctrine. We will look at particular historical figures that contribute significantly to the development of doctrine, as well as some key events, ideas, and movements that Christian beliefs were watered and nourished by. The course will we reflective and devotional in nature. The student will not be asked to do critical, historical science, but rather to listen to the story and seek to understand how that story ministers to us currently, and build bridges from historical understanding to personal spiritual formation, the role of the church in society, and contemporary ministry.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

The following are competencies for Ordination Course of Study which are achieved by this course:

- 1. Ability to describe the general story line of Church History and the development of the major doctrines and creeds through the early Middle Ages.
- 2. Ability to identify and describe the significance of the major figures, themes, and events of the Apostolic, Patristic and Medieval periods of Church History.
- 3. Ability to describe how the church implemented its mission in the various periods of Church History.

RESEARCH / REFLECTION PAPERS

Each week students will bring answers to discussion questions as outlined below. The answers will reflect reading from the text, and insight gained from at least one video-tube that relates to the lesson. The class will be oriented around the questions, but will assume that the student has read the lessons in their entirely. The answers each week should be about 500 words.

JOURNAL

Students will note that in the textbook reading, each of the 12 lessons contains selections from Augustine, *The Confessions*. Keep the journal on a regular basis. The Journal entries should reflect on how the text speaks to the student's heart. Date your entries. Submit on July 1. Probably 900 words in all.
